CHAIRMAN'S REMARKS

Society members joining our study trip to Haddon Hall and Renishaw Hall on 25 July will be able to see, among many other treasures, the Chippendale commode pictured above. It was made for Sir Penistone, Lamb, 1st Viscount Melbourne, for Melbourne house in Piccadilly, about 1773. Two years later Chippendale's business partner Thomas Haig gave Thomas Mouat, a young Shetlander on his first trip to London, a tour of the house, and Mouat remembered 'a Commode table of inlaid work [which] cost £140'. The commode was made *en suite* with a pair of glazed cabinets, now at Firle Place, Sussex. All three pieces of furniture are veneered with holly, against which pale background the colourful marquetry would have stood out in spectacular contrast. When the contents of Melbourne House were sold in 1802 the commode was bought

by Sir Sitwell Sitwell and was eventually installed in his house at Renishaw, Derbyshire, where it remains. The Haddon and Renishaw trip is just one of a full schedule of events we are running this year, culminating in a four-day tour in the Cotswolds in September. The first of these events is our Annual General Meeting, which will take place at Temple Newsam on 13 May. All members are welcome to attend.

The meeting will be followed by our Annual Lecture, given this year by David Jones, one of our most distinguished furniture historians and a recognised authority on Chippendale's work in Scotland. Further details of this and all other events are given overleaf.

Study Day to Sutton Park and Shandy Hall 13 June 2024

In the morning we meet at Sutton Park, situated eight miles to the north of York. It is the home of the Sheffield family, formerly of Normanby Park, Lincolnshire, since 1963. Sutton Park is a neat Georgian house with a 5-bay facade, built in the 1730s for Richard Harland and altered in 1750 by Thomas Atkinson for Richard's son Thomas. The interiors include a Chinese Drawing Room with 18th-century wallpaper and plasterwork attributed to Guiseppe Cortese. Much of the collection comes from Normanby Park and Buckingham House, the London seat of John Sheffield, 1st Duke of Buckingham (later sold to George II and now Buckingham Palace). Outside amongst the grounds of many ancient trees is a wildflower-filled walled garden. We are very privileged to have a private tour of this family home.

In the afternoon we travel 20 minutes north to Coxwold for a private tour of Shandy Hall. This small brick-faced house is a complete contrast to our morning visit. Laurence Sterne, formerly vicar of Sutton on the Forest but better known as the author of *Tristram Shandy*, lived here towards the end of his life.

Parts of the Hall date back to the 15th century and it includes 17th-century panelling and a refaced 18th-century garden front. In later years the Hall suffered many years of neglect until renovated by The Laurence Sterne Trust, and it is now a charming and cosy home. Many Sterne mementos have been gathered by the Trust and the library reflects more personally the life of the author. The garden, although small, is equally charming and commands views towards Byland Abbey and the North York Moors.

Please note that there is no coach for this Study Day. We meet at Sutton Park at **10.15am** (Sutton-on-the-Forest, York, YO61 1DP) and at Shandy Hall at **2pm** (Coxwold, York, YO614AD). Although refreshments are not included, there is a cafe near Sutton Park and in Coxwold the well-known pub The Fauconberg Arms serves lunches to suit all appetites (Tel: 01347 868 214). The cost for this Study Day is £36, to include entrance fees and two private tours, and the **closing date is 13 May 2024.**

Study Day to Haddon Hall and Renishaw Hall 25th July 2024

In the morning we go by coach to Haddon Hall, near Bakewell in Derbyshire. Haddon has been described as 'the most perfect house to survive from the Middle Ages'. It was acquired by Sir Richard de Vernon in 1170 and has been owned by his descendants ever since, passing by marriage to the Manners family in the 16th century, when Sir George Vernon's daughter Dorothy reputedly eloped with John Manners, son of the Earl of Rutland. Belvoir Castle and Haddon Hall have been united in the ownership of the Earls of Rutland ever since. After 1700 the hall was little used, and it remained almost unaltered in its 16th century condition until inherited by John Manners, 9th Duke of Rutland, who set about restoring it I the early 20th century. Highlights include the medieval Great Hall and kitchens, the 15th-century Chapel, and the wonderful Long Gallery, lined with early

17th-century panelling, embroidered chairs and ribbed plaster ceiling. We will be able to enjoy the terraced garden looking over the River Wye after our tour.

In the afternoon we travel to Renishaw Hall, near Chesterfield, the former home of the Sitwell family. The Hall was built in 1625 as a conventional Jacobean house and was Gothicised at the turn of the 19th century. The present owner is Alexandra Hayward, daughter of Sir Reresby Sitwell, 7th Baronet. The interiors hold an interesting collection and some eccentric interiors. There is excellent decorative and fine art, including the largest vase of Derbyshire Blue John surviving, Dutch paintings and an important Chippendale commode made for Sir Penistone Lamb, 1st Viscount Melbourne, about 1773. We are delighted to have a private tour of the house and afterwards we can enjoy the beautiful gardens.

The cost for this day, including coach travel, all admission fees, two private guided tours and an afternoon cream tea, is £95. The cost without the coach is £88. The closing date for applications is May 30th 2024. Application forms can be found at the end of this newsletter

Study tour to the Cotswolds 9th-12th September 2024

We are delighted to offer this three night, four-day study tour of the Cotswolds based at the four-star De Vere Cotswold Water Park Hotel near Cirencester. Booking is on a dinner, bed and breakfast basis and includes coach travel with Hargreaves coaches. The exciting part of this study tour is that, unusually, all the houses visited are privately owned.

On our first day, Monday, 9th September, we travel down from Yorkshire to our railway pick-up point at Moreton-in-Marsh and then drive through the Cotswolds to Rodmarton Manor near Cirencester. This Arts and Crafts house was designed by Ernest Barnsley for Claude and Margaret Biddulph and completed in 1929. It is still owned by the Biddulph family. The exterior may seem austere but the comfortable interior is filled with specially commissioned furniture and artefacts by Arts & Crafts luminaries such Sidney Barnsley and Alfred Hoare Powell. C.R. Ashbee called it 'The English Arts and Crafts Movement at its best'. We are delighted to have a private tour and lunch, after which we will travel to our hotel to check in.

On Tuesday, 10th September, we travel a short distance to the 16th-century Chavenage House near Tetbury. Built 1564-1576 for Edward Stephens, it remained in the Stephens family into the 19th century when it was bought by the Lowsley-Williams family. David Lowsley-Williams is the current owner. Chavenage is renowned for its Civil War connections, when it served as the base for the siege by Parliament forces of nearby Beverston Castle. In contrast to the early parts of the house there is an extension of 1904 to the rear by the Arts and Craft Architect John Micklethwaite, with an unusual ballroom. Our guided tour will be followed by lunch and a short visit to the gardens.

After lunch we travel north to visit Stanway House, a complete contrast to Chavenage and Rodmarton Manor. Stanway is a magical Jacobean house built in the 16th century with an earlier 14th century tithe barn. It is home to the Earl of Wemyss and it is furnished with wonderful fine and decorative arts including two 'Chinese' day beds attributed to Thomas Chippendale. Here we have a private tour of the house followed by a self-guided tour of the gardens.

On Wednesday, 11th September we travel south to Corsham Court near Chippenham, the home of Lord Methuen. The house was built in 1582, enlarged and adapted in the 18th century and remodelled again in the 19th. The grounds were landscaped by Capability Brown and, later, by Humphrey Repton. The rich interior contains an outstanding collection of fine and decorative arts. On our private tour we will see furniture by John Cobb and Robert Adam and paintings by Tintoretto, Veronese, Salvator Rosa and Van Dyck, amongst others.

In the afternoon we travel ten minutes to Bowood House where we will see the collections of the Marquesses of Lansdowne. We will enjoy a guided tour of the Robert Adam designed Orangery, the Tapestry gallery and a purpose-made gallery created from the stables and grooms' quarters which houses a wonderful collection of English watercolours.

On Thursday, 12th September, we travel north of Cirencester to Sudeley Castle. This important medieval and Tudor castle was used as a base by Prince Rupert, Charles I's nephew and Royalist cavalry commander in the Civil War. However, the current house, with the ruins of the castle nearby, is the work of Worcester architect Harvey Eginton for the Dent brothers, Worcestershire glove makers, who bought the estate in 1837. George Gilbert Scott restored the nearby chapel in which is the effigy of Catherine Parr, Henry VIII's sixth Queen, who died at Sudeley in 1548. Inside the castle is an amazing collection of fine and decorative art, including a textile collection considered one of the finest in the country. We will enjoy a brief talk about the castle and family on arrival followed by an independent tour of the house and gardens, and we will end with a light lunch.

After lunch we move to Sezincote. The house is an exotic two-story bungalow with minarets and a copper dome, designed in 1805 by Samuel Pepys Cockerell in the neo-Moghul style. It was built for his brother Sir Charles Cockerell, who also employed Humphrey Repton to lay out the gardens. The nearest parallel is with the Royal Pavilion at Brighton. In the 1960s the interior designer John Fowler was employed to modify Cockerell's interiors. The house was acquired by Sir Cyril Kleinwort in 1944 and is still privately owned. Here we have a private tour of the house and an independent tour of the Repton gardens. From Sezincote we will be able to stop at Moreton-in-Marsh railway station before making our way back to Ilkley via Leeds.

The cost for the four days, including coach travel, all admission fees and guided tours, three lunches and dinner bed and breakfast at the four star De Vere Cotswold Water Park Hotel is £625 per person sharing a double/twin room and £725 (including single supplement) for a single room. A deposit of £150 with a completed application form is required by 21st May 2024 and the balance of £475 for a person sharing a double/twin room and £575 for a single room will be payable by the 30th June 2024.
