To BENINGBROUGH HALL and BURTON AGNES HALL. Beningbrough, a dignified red brick house on the banks of the River Ouse, was built early in the 18th Century. It houses an interesting collection of furniture and the Vanbrughian Hall and more intimate carved friezes in the drawing-room are amongst additional highlights. Burton Agnes near Bridlington, a Jacobean house with Robert Smythson connections, will equally interest The spectacular carved screen and alabaster members. chimney-piece in the Great Hall, also the collection of French Impressionist paintings, are important features of the Hall.

Members should bring picnic lunches to eat at Beningbrough. A stop will be made for tea after the visit to Burton Agnes, but the cost of this is not included in the price of the ticket and must be paid for separately on the 27th July. JOINT FURNITURE HISTORY and CHIPPENDALE SOCIETY CONFERENCE.

Fortunately, for Yorkshire hosts, who always wish visitors to view their county with pleasure, Friday April 26th offered a fine sunny afternoon and evening; delegates were, accordingly, able to see the countryside at it's 26 - 28th April 1974. best. Many had come from far afield, San Francisco, Washington, Alberta also Edinburgh, London and Bristol.

The conference, once assembled at the Post House Bramhope, travelled by coach to the Otley Civic Centre where Lady Stoddart-Scott, the hostess for the evening, set the tone for the whole weekend with her warm Yorkshire welcome. Her generosity included an invitation to Creskeld Hall for drinks after the two evening lectures. These talks proved most interesting and instructive: Christopher Gilbert spoke on "Chippendale at Farnley, Harewood and Nostell" while Christopher Hutchinson reviewed "Ten Masterpieces at Temple Newsam and Lotherton Hall". A feature of both lectures were the very fine accompanying slides.

Saturday April 27th. After breakfast delegates left by coach for Farnley Hall. The owner, Mr. G.N. Le G. Horton-Fawkes was most generous and patient; we felt, as John Ruskin, that "Farnley is a unique place, there is nothing quite like it in the world". After the intimate atmosphere of Farnley, the party moved on to Harewood House with its great collection of Chippendate furniture; special access was appreciated by the delegates. Saturday afternoon was spent viewing the memorable collection of Chippendale furniture at Nostell Priory and we were indebted to the tolerance of the guides as alarm bells disturbed the peaceful atmosphere of the house. In the evening members gathered for a collective dinner, enlivened by a Chippendale Quiz which was won by Edward Joy's table.

Sunday April 28th. On the last day of the conference we departed for Temple Newsam and Lotherton Hall; by now the weather had turned distinctly cool. Both houses and their art collections were greatly admired and once again special privileges enabled delegates to open many fine cabinet pieces and ignore ropes.

The Conference dispersed at 2.30 p.m. Thanks are due to Messrs. Gilbert and Hutchinson for organising the weekend and to Mr. Hull, the manager of The Post House, for his helpful interest.
